The Farm at Prophetstown



Take I-65 to exit number 178 which is SR 43 go south on SR 43 for a very short distance and then turn left onto Burnett Rd. Burnett Road will "T" into 9th St. Go right on 9th St. to Swisher Road which will be a hard left immediately after the Veterinary Office. Once on Swisher Rd you will cross back under the Interstate and find the Park Gatehouse directly ahead.

The Farm at Prophetstown is located within Prophetstown State Park. Discover the 1920's farmstead lifestyles, dedicated to showing, sharing, and teaching alternative agriculture practices and horse powered farming. The Farm at Prophetstown is a non-profit organization.



Corn Husking History

Corn husking is the oldest method of harvesting corn. Before the 1920's, farmers would husk corn by hand. There were no machines invented for the farmers to use. Instead, they went into the fields with horses and wagons to husk corn from the stalk. The corn would be stored in barns to feed cows, pigs, horses, sheep and goats for the next season. Extra corn not needed for the winter months would be sold for family income.

Large farms often hired migrant workers for the harvest season. Workers would start in Florida picking fruit then move to Georgia for the peach harvest and continue to the Midwestern Corn Belt for the corn harvest.



Smaller farms were harvested by families, neighbors, and friends. They all would gather to help each other bring in the crops for the season. Beginning at daylight and working until sundown each day, everyone in the family helped with the harvest.
